Temperate

• 1 Timothy 3:2 — "An overseer, then, must be above reproach, the husband of one wife, **temperate**, prudent, respectable, hospitable, able to teach"

Temperate

- 1 Tim. 3:2

- Defined: (nēphalios) sober, vigilant; abstaining from wine, calm and collected in spirit, dispassionate, circumspect; clear-headed, selfcontrolled
- Like a good shepherd, an elder must be alert and watchful over God's sheep
 - Elders must watch for spiritual sickness within and threats from without – Acts 20:28-31
 - Elders must be vigilant in providing spiritual nourishment for the health of the sheep – Acts 20:32

Prudent/ Sensible

- 1 Timothy 3:2 "An overseer, then, must be above reproach, the husband of one wife, temperate, **prudent**, respectable, hospitable, able to teach"
- Titus 1:8 "...hospitable, loving what is good, sensible, just, devout, selfcontrolled"

Prudent/ Sensible

-1 Tim. 3:2
Titus 1:8

- <u>Defined</u>: (sōphrōn) of sound mind, selfcontrolled, sober-minded; curbing one's desires and impulses, temperate; prudent, thoughtful
- Application:
 - One must have shown himself wise, or of sound mind, in dealing with life
 - He is not in the habit of making poor, thoughtless decisions
 - One should not seek the office who often finds himself the victim of his own lack of forethought or who is prone to silliness or frivolity.

Self-Controlled - Titus 1:8

- Titus 1:8 "...hospitable, loving what is good, sensible, just, devout, self-controlled
- <u>Defined</u>: (egkratēs) strong; mastering, controlling one's self, restraining [of self], temperate, having power over [self], disciplined
- While sōphrōn (prudent) emphasizes the soundness of mind and wisdom, egkratēs emphasizes the need for deliberate self-control
- Application: An elder must be aware of challenges of various situations and be of the mind to control his temper, emotions, and desires
- These qualities can only be added to one's life through prayer and study of the word – 1 Pet. 2:21-23; James 1:5-6

Respectable

- 1 Tim. 3:2 "An overseer, then, must be above reproach, the husband of one wife, temperate, prudent, **respectable**, hospitable, able to teach
- <u>Defined</u>: (kosmios) orderly, modest, wellarranged, seemly; decorum [in keeping with good taste, polite, restrained], a well-ordered life, respectable, honorable
- Application:
 - He must be one whose life invokes respect and honor in the eyes of others
 - He is not haphazard concerning his personal life, family, financial matters, or his brethren

Hospitable

- 1 Timothy 3:2 "An overseer, then, must be above reproach, the husband of one wife, temperate, prudent, respectable, hospitable, able to teach"
- Titus 1:8 "...**hospitable**, loving what is good, sensible, just, devout, self-controlled"

Hospitable

-1 Tim. 3:2
Titus 1:8

- <u>Defined</u>: (philoxenos) hospitable; fond of guests, given to (lover of) hospitality; generous to guests
 - Literally "love of strangers," referring to one who finds joy in entertaining and lodging others
 - Because "strangers" is prominent in the meaning, it is not about reciprocal action

Application:

- This is a foundational quality of any Christian –
 Rom. 12:10-13
- An elder must be an example of hospitableness, willing to use his home, time, and resources for the good of others
- This is why it is important for us to get out of our "comfort zones" – Heb. 13:1-2
