MORE THAN “SIN MANAGEMENT”

Last week an interesting question was asked on Facebook. The questioner wanted to know is there anything we can learn for today from Jesus’ words in Luke 11:24-26?

When the unclean spirit has gone out of a person, it passes through waterless places seeking rest, and finding none it says, “I will return to my house from which I came.” And when it comes, it finds the house swept and put in order. Then it goes and brings seven other spirits more evil than itself, and they enter and dwell there. And the last state of that person is worse than the first.

One individual responded that a good application would be those who focus primarily upon “sin management” without thinking much of the positive, good works Christ desires in his people. I think there is much to commend in that response.

Being a Christian is not just, or even primarily, an emptying act. It is a filling one. There is far more than seeking to empty one’s life of sin, “managing” it, in being a child of God. That dead thing immersed into the blood of Jesus Christ was resurrected there, vibrant and alive, filled with the Spirit, ready and devoted to every good work. (Romans 6; Colossians 3:1-4; Acts 5:32; Titus 3:1-8)

I am saddened when I hear fallen Christians claiming that being a Christian “is only about keeping rules.” That is so far from the truth! There is such a thing as sin, it does create a separation between man and God, and it must be avoided. (Isaiah 59:1-2) Jesus’ sacrifice was specifically designed to pay the debt for sin. (John 1:29) May we praise him eternally for that!
